Triple Bets

The most challenging but rewarding bets, triples require all three dice to show the same number. You can bet on a specific triple (like three 6s) for a massive 150:1 payout, or any triple for a 30:1 payout.

Tips for Playing Sic Bo

Start with Simple Bets

New players should focus on Small, Big, Odd, and Even bets. These offer the best odds and help you get comfortable with the game's rhythm without risking large losses on complex combinations.

Manage Your Bankroll Carefully
