Selecting the Right Finish and Color

Consider both aesthetics and maintenance when picking finishes. Solid wood stains show natural grain and hide minor wear; painted finishes offer a uniform look and easier color matching for open-concept homes.

Pick colors based on light and traffic. White or light greys brighten small Moncton kitchens and hide dust, while darker tones show fingerprints but provide a high-contrast focal point. Test full-size door samples under your kitchen's lighting before committing.

Finish durability matters. Use durable conversion varnish or UV-cured finishes in high-traffic kitchens. For wet areas near the coast, choose finishes and sealants rated for moisture resistance to limit swelling and finish degradation.

Professional Kitchen Cabinet Installation and Maintenance

Maintaining and Cleaning Your Cabinets

Establish a weekly surface-cleaning habit using a soft cloth and a mild, pH-neutral cleaner or diluted dish soap. Avoid abrasive pads, straight ammonia, or bleach solutions that remove finish or dull paint.

Seasonally check hinges, drawer slides, and catch hardware. Tighten loose screws and lubricate metal slides with a silicone-based spray. Inspect seals around sinks and backsplashes for water intrusion and re-caulk any gaps to prevent swelling or delamination.

For painted or stained surfaces, wipe spills immediately and use a wood-safe polish sparingly to restore sheen. For laminate or thermofoil, avoid high heat and steam; repair chips promptly

with manufacturer-recommended touch-up kits. Keep humidity in your home between 35–55% to reduce warping and stickiness.
