Addressing Water Damage

Act quickly: lift wet area coverings and dry the floor with fans and dehumidifiers within 24–48 hours to limit swelling. If boards cup or buckle after drying, the laminate's core has likely absorbed moisture and will need repair or replacement.

Inspect the affected area by separating seams and checking the underside for softening or discoloration. Small edge swelling can sometimes be sanded slightly and sealed with a waterproof laminate repair compound; match the color with a touch-up kit for a less noticeable fix.

For extensive damage—persistent buckling, delamination, or soft cores—remove and replace the damaged planks. Also trace and fix the moisture source (leak, high humidity, or improper underlayment) to prevent recurrence. A professional can test moisture levels and recommend underlayment or vapor barriers if your subfloor contributes to the problem.

Fixing Scratches and Chips

For light surface scratches, clean the area and use a colored laminate repair paste or marker that matches your floor's finish. Apply sparingly, wipe excess immediately, and then buff gently with a soft cloth to blend the repair.

Deeper scratches or small chips require slightly different steps. Use a two-part wood filler or laminate repair putty, press it into the defect, smooth with a plastic scraper, and let it cure according to product instructions. After curing, lightly sand only if the texture requires it, then apply a matching finish sealant to protect the repair.

For widespread surface wear—faded finish across multiple boards—consider a complete plank replacement or professional resurfacing alternatives. Keep replacement planks from the original installation if possible so grain and color match precisely.

Replacing Damaged Planks

Start by identifying whether your laminate uses a click-lock or glued seam system. Click-lock planks often allow removal by unlocking adjacent rows; glued systems may require cutting out the damaged plank with a circular saw set to board depth.

When removing a plank, protect surrounding boards. For click-lock floors, disengage the row and lift the damaged plank. For glued floors, score along seams and pry out the plank pieces carefully. Clean the exposed subfloor of adhesive and debris before installing the replacement.

Fit a matching plank—use leftover material from the original installation if available. Apply manufacturer-recommended adhesive for glued systems or click the new plank into place for floating floors. Finish by reinstalling trim and allowing any adhesives to cure fully before foot traffic. If alignment or moisture issues caused the damage, correct those first to avoid repeat failures.
