Why Post-Storm Roof Inspection Is Critical in Sydney

The problem is that roof damage isn't always immediately visible. A tile might be slightly cracked but still sitting in place. Flashing might be bent but not fully separated. By then, more damage could be occurring as water infiltrates your roof cavity.

The Immediate Safety Considerations

Before we talk about what to inspect, let's talk about safety. This is serious stuff.

Don't Get on the Roof Yourself

I know it's tempting to hop up there yourself and have a look around, particularly if you're a handy sort of person. Don't do it. Roofs are dangerous at the best of times – slippery, uneven, with hidden hazards. After a storm, they're actively dangerous. Tiles might be loose and give way beneath your feet. Metal might be sharp and jagged. You could have structural damage that makes the roof unstable.

Get a licensed roofer to do it. Seriously.

What to Do Immediately After a Storm

The hours and days immediately following a storm are crucial. Here's what you should do.

Document the Damage Thoroughly

Before the weather clears and dries things out, take photos and videos of everything. Get wide shots and close-ups. Document any visible debris, broken branches, missing tiles, damaged gutters, water stains, and anything else that looks out of place. Take photos from multiple angles.

Also photograph the state of your yard, garden, and surroundings. This provides context for the storm's severity, which is useful for insurance claims.

Scheduling Your Post-Storm Roof Inspection

Timing matters when it comes to post-storm roof inspection. You don't want to wait too long, but you also want to give roofers time to get to you when they're swamped with storm-related callouts.

Don't Expect Immediate Service

When storms hit, roofers get absolutely bombarded with requests. If you call immediately after a major storm, you might have to wait a week or more for an appointment. That's normal. If you've got an active leak causing significant water damage, explain this when you call and ask if they can squeeze you in earlier.

Get Multiple Quotes

After a major storm, get at least two – ideally three – quotes from different roofers before committing to repairs. This helps ensure you're not being overcharged by roofers capitalising on storm damage. Document all quotes and keep copies for insurance purposes.

What the Professional Should Inspect

When the roofer arrives, they should inspect the following thoroughly:

Roof Tiles or Shingles

Look for cracked, broken, or missing tiles. Even small cracks can allow water entry. Tiles can also be displaced or loose without being obviously broken. The roofer should check the entire roof surface, not just visible problem areas.

Flashing and Seals

Flashing around chimneys, vents, valleys, and edges is critical for keeping water out. Storm damage can bend, separate, or damage flashing. Sealants can crack or fail. All of these [roofing](#) need inspection and repair if damaged.

Understanding the Inspection Report

When you get the inspection report from the roofer, it should be detailed and clear. Here's what to look for:

Detailed Descriptions

The report should describe damage locations specifically – "three broken tiles on the north-facing roof slope, approximately 2 metres from the ridge" is more useful than "some broken tiles."

Repair Recommendations

The roofer should clearly recommend what repairs are needed and prioritise them. Some damage is urgent and needs immediate repair; other damage is less critical.

Documentation for Insurance Claims

Insurance claims require proper documentation. Here's what you need:

Incident Report

Document the date, time, and nature of the storm. What was the weather like? How long did it last? Were there other properties in your area damaged?

Initial Damage Photos

Your photos and videos from immediately after the storm are crucial evidence.

Common Storm Damage in Sydney

Here are the most common types of roof damage Sydney roofers see after storms:

Broken or Cracked Tiles

Hail and wind can crack or break roof tiles. Even one broken tile needs attention as it compromises the roof's weather resistance.
